1 God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. 2 Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, 3 though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging. 4 There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy place where the Most High dwells. 5 God is within her, she will not fall; God will help her at break of day. 6 Nations are in uproar, kingdoms fall; he lifts his voice, the earth melts. 7 The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. 8 Come and see the works of the LORD, the desolations he has brought on the earth. 9 He makes wars cease to the ends of the earth; he breaks the bow and shatters the spear, he burns the shields with fire. 10 "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." 11 The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. (Psalm 46)

There seems to be a lot to be scared about lately doesn't there? A woman was stabbed to death on the subway. Charlie Kirk was murdered in cold blood. Right here in New Ulm and Courtland three people were hit by vehicles and seriously injured. And the week of writing this, there were 10 funerals at Minnesota Valley Funeral Home, 4 of which were led by St. Paul's Pastors. There's always that ever present fear of illness, injury, poverty, and death.

But as we gather to celebrate Reformation Sunday this month, we are reminded of the powerful message found in Psalm 46, which has inspired countless hymns, including Martin Luther's beloved "A Mighty Fortress," a regular rally cry of the Lutheran Reformation. This Psalm reassures us that God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in times of trouble, no matter what the trouble is.

In a world filled with uncertainties—be it political unrest or national conflict, or personal struggles in your marriage, with your kids, or with your health or finances—fear can easily take hold of our hearts. Yet, God, through Psalm 46 encourages us to cast aside our fears and trust in God's promises. The Psalmist reminds us that even when the earth shakes and nations rise against one another, we need not fear, for God is with us. And that's proven most clearly in the gospel. God is with us in Christ. Immanuel, "God with us," left heaven and

came to earth to live a perfect life in our place and die an innocent death on a cross to pay for our sin. Now among all the uncertainties of life we can always be certain of this: We are forgiven. We have peace with God. Heaven itself is ours.

Luther himself grappled with fear and doubt, but he found solace in the truth that God is our fortress. We are saved by God's grace alone, through faith alone, as revealed by God's Scriptures alone. Nothing can take that from us. This assurance allows us to be still and recognize that our salvation is secure through Christ. So we can let go of our worries and embrace the peace that comes from knowing God is always by our side.

As we reflect on these truths this coming Reformation Day, let's remember: "No guilt in life, no fear in death; this is the power of Christ in me." May we stand firm in our faith, knowing that the Lord Almighty is with us, and may we face each day with courage and confidence. Have no fear!

LWMS Convention 2025

I was a delegate from St. John's, as was Markey Kuckhahn. We went by bus to Tulsa, Oklahoma, where the Arvest Convention Center had room for the almost 700 attendees. The theme was Sowing the Seeds of Faith, I Cor. 3: 6-9. The bus took 2 days to get there and two days back, and the convention was 4 days. We stayed at a hotel nearby. 64 countries were represented, and we saw the flags of all of them. We heard from many missionaries from all over the country and world. I sat in on work being done in Arizona, Amarillo, Australia, , etc. Some of the work is being done by computer, such as Academia Christo. One goal is to get more pastors and evangelist from the country itself, since they seem to have more success. Donations are collected all year. The totals for this year were \$ 66,000 for Home Ministries (Campus Ministry) and \$66,000 for World Missions (Bangladesh). The convention gave us each much enlightenment on God's work everywhere. The next convention will be in Madison, Wisconsin, the last weekend in June, 2026.

Library News

Did you get a chance to watch the "One on One" movie at the New Ulm Theatre a month or two ago? Now you have another chance since the OWLS group donated a DVD copy to our library. It can be checked out as usual, but please return it within a short time so others can watch it also. It is the story of a cop who became a believer and then became a pastor and started spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ to people on a One on One basis. It is based on a true story.

We have another DVD that was donated to our library. It is Season 5 of "The Chosen". It has 8 episodes in it, on three discs, to total 458 minutes. Here again, do not hold it too long so others can watch it also. Also notice that we have a whole shelf of DVD's that can be checked out and watched. Notice that there are several versions of Luther films in the library, since it is October, and Reformation is at the end of the month.

There is also a book to add to the library. Ken Ham, the man behind the Creation Museum and the Ark Encounter in Kentucky, and Bodie Hodge have collected 25 answers to questions about creation, evolution, and the Bible. As part of the group "Answers in Genesis", these writers explain how Creation and the Bible make sense and answer basic questions, that evolution cannot. Using the Bible as truth, they answer the basic questions such as Is there a really a God? What is wrong with million of years? Who was Cain's wife? Could God really create all in 6 days? Was there really a flood like Noah's? How about dinosaurs? Where does the Ice Age fit in? Does archeology support the Bible? This book, "New Answers #1" is the first book in a four part series. We already have book 4 in our library. The series was started in 2006 but has had 34 printings up to 2024. This adds up to almost 100 questions answered about creation, evolution, and the Bible. It was good reading.

Stewardship Committee

Did you know that St. John's has a "wish list". On occasion a board or committee would like something that is not covered in their regular budget. When that is the case, they can request that the item they want be added to a St. John's wish list. They fill out a request form that details what they would like, costs, and why it is important to the ministry at St. John's. This form is given to the Board of Stewardship for approval. If the request is approved, the congregation is made aware that there is a new item on the wish list so that those who are moved to do so may designate an offering for the purchase of that item. It remains on the wish list until enough designated offerings are received, after which the item is purchased and goes off the wish list.

Two items have recently been added to the wish list.

- 1. Music folders for the Jr. Choir \$600.00
- 2. A small grand piano for the front of the sanctuary \$21,400.00

Here are the details.

Junior Choir Folders: The request is for durable choir folders for St. Paul's School Junior Choir. Inexpensive ones were purchased a while back but did not hold up long. The folders would be used in the three-a-week choir practices at school and at worship services. About 30 would be needed. These more durable folders would help protect the music used by the choir and help ensure it lasts for years to come. The stewardship committee approved \$600.00 for this wish list item.

Grand Piano for the front of the sanctuary: St. John's Worship Committee would like to replace the piano in the front of the church. The existing piano was never meant to be effective in a large space seating around 350 people. It was meant for a room in a house or a small music studio. The committee would like to purchase a new 5-foot Yamaha grand piano. The piano would fit in front of the church next to the lectern. The piano would be better able to fill the church with sound. Yamaha pianos are known for their stability of tuning and action, something desired in our ever-changing climate conditions. Yamaha pianos deliver a clear sound that would accompany choirs well. The Stewardship committee approved this item for the wish list for \$21,400.00 which includes the piano, piano truck for easy transport, custom fitted cover, piano Life Saver Humidity control system, delivery and assembly.

As I consider how well the members of St. John's support our ministries, I am reminded of what happened when offerings were needed for the building of the tabernacle in the wilderness. May the Lord move us to provide "more than enough" for the work we do for our gracious Savior who gave everything for us.

The Lord said to Moses, "Tell the Israelites to bring me an offering. You are to receive the offering for me from everyone whose heart prompts them to give." (Ex 25:2)

"The people continued to bring freewill offerings morning after morning. So all the skilled workers who were doing all the work on the sanctuary left what they were doing and said to Moses, "The people are bringing more than enough for doing the work the Lord commanded to be done." (Ex 36:3-5)


Central Africa Medical Mission

This past August, I had the privilege to travel to both Malawi and Zambia to visit our CAMM clinics, meet the medical and administrative staff, and visit with the people being served in these areas. I observed dedicated staff who have been blessed with hearts of service for the Lord and deeply care for the health of the community. One of my objectives during my visit was to get to the bottom of some most common questions I receive from our Contact Women around the US.

Where is my package and why does it take so long to arrive at the clinic? This is very likely the most common question I receive from Contact Women. Upon my arrival in Malawi, one of my

first questions for Lusungu Mwambeye, the Clinic Administrator at the Lutheran Mobile Clinic was, can we visit the Post Office? In Malawi, packages are not delivered directly to the property where the ambulance is packed up each day to travel out to each of the mobile clinic sites. Rather, staff make regular visits to the Post Office to check to see if any packages have cleared Customs and are ready to be

Lusungu tries to get to the Post Office once each week if possible. Once at the Post Office, she checks the clinic's box for a notification of packages and often is sent to another window around the back of the office for the actual pickup process. As you can see from the picture, this particular day, we picked up a number of packages. It was fun to see many of your names and addresses from the US. After packages are brought back to the Mobile Clinic Office site.



One additional question I receive often is whether or not CAMM is charged for receipt of packages and the answer is yes. In Malawi, CAMM is charged about \$1.00 for each package and in Zambia the charges are based on weight and often amount to about \$2-3 per package. Many of



our Contact Women wonder if the charges are related to the value that is declared on the shipping documents and the answer to that is currently no.

So keep the packages coming and pray for patience. They are arriving safely and are being put to quick use at each of the clinics.

God's Hand at Work

During my visit to the Mobile Clinic in Malawi and the clinic in Zambia I was filled with comfort and joy as I observed the hard work and dedication of the staff and watched as the items our Contact Women have lovingly packaged and sent were put to good use. Families traveled on foot with young children and older relatives to be cared for each day. Each day began with the word of God and everyone waited with such patience for the medical attention they needed. The staff found joy in their purpose and never complained about the work that God had called them to do each day. It was an inspiration to witness and a reminder for me to be every thankful for the blessings God has showered on this important mission field.

Closing thoughts

It was nothing less than a privilege to travel and visit our CAMM Clinics. I am so thankful for all that our Contact Women, LWMS and ladies groups do to support this work. Your packages, prayers, and gift are so needed and you are making a difference. Thank you for all that you do to support CAMM.


