## DISPEL THE DARKNESS

**The path of the righteous is like the first gleam of dawn, shining ever brighter till the full light of day.** (Proverbs 4:18)

Advent is a season of hope. The blue paraments remind us of the color of the sky where we look in hope for the Lord's revelation. We place candles on a wreath, week by week adding the light of yet another candle each time we re-light the wreath in order to indicate the dispelling of the darkness until the day when we celebrate the fulfillment of the hope that is ours in God.

In many ways Advent depicts the life of the Christian. The writer of the book of Proverbs describes the life of the Christian in this way: **The path of the righteous is like the first gleam of dawn, shining ever brighter till the full light of day.** (Proverbs 4:18)

Not everything in the life of the Christian is easily understood, especially at first. We learn that there is right and wrong. We know that God hates wrong and loves good. Then we learn that we don't always do good, in fact, that we are not good enough to earn God's love and salvation.

But then we learn that God in his love sent a Savior to deliver us from our sin. Jesus Christ lived and died for you and me. We start out with the basic truth that Jesus loves me this I know, for the Bible tells me so. However, as we mature in our faith and grow in the knowledge of our Savior, our sensitivity to the law of God also becomes sharper as we become more aware of our sin. We are made ever more aware of our need for the Savior. As we find a deeper need for comfort, we are also led into a deeper understanding of the Gospel by the Holy Spirit. We search the Bible in hope of greater consolation; and it is there -- the great hope which we seek. It is there where we find these comforting words from St. Paul who wrote in **Romans 5:20: Where sin increased, grace increased all the more.** That is to say, no matter how severe the sin, no matter how deep the sorrow, the joy of the Gospel surpasses it. No matter how dark the path under the valley of the shadow of death, the light of our heavenly hope in Christ will still be the light for our path. Therefore, the Christian walk is one in which we are always able to look beyond the pains and sorrows which confront us and find comfort in the greater hope that is always ours in Jesus Christ our Savior.

Therefore, this Advent season, let us remember that as the candles dispel the darkness in the church, even so, in Jesus Christ the darkness of sin and the ignorance about God's salvation plan for the world is dispelled by the message Christ's Advent. For in the Christmas proclamation that the

Savior has been born the light of heaven shines on us in the glorious hope of a better life beyond this one and the fulfillment the promise guaranteeing joy beyond all understanding.

The St. John's Church Council met on November 15, 2022. A summary of reports and actions not reported elsewhere in the *Fortress* follows:

Deacon Brad Price reported October attendance numbers, including guests over the MN Lutheran teachers' conference weekend. The online attendance averaged 62.5 per week.

The **Elders** Board chair Jason Mohror informed the council of the Elders' plans to implement procedures for St. John's employee reviews in the 2023 calendar year.

**Evangelism** Board chair Jesse Zahrt updated the council members on outreach into the community. John & Paul Ministries Trunk or Treat events connected with 750 people, yet the concern is that with several other organizations now holding a similar event, it may become just another trick or treating event - rather than a "come join us at St. Paul's school" for a JPM event.

The Evangelism Board is continuing to provide opportunities for congregation members to continue connections into the community.

November 25 - Parade of Lights at 6 pm St. Johns members made connections into the community with smiles and invitations to Advent and Christmas services. Watch for guests this holiday season and introduce yourself to a new face. Either way, it is someone who will benefit from a Gospel-motivated introduction.

November 26 - The new Christmas banners go up in the entryway arches and remain up through Advent and Christmas as a talking point to share with others as an opportunity to share the joyful gift of our Savior, Jesus.

The **Stewardship** Board reported the formation of a subcommittee to look at Future Finances. The subcommittee's goals include:

- a. Assessing the status of the progress of several committees working on current and future projects at St. John's
- b. Projecting financial implications of each committee's work
- c. Determining and collating probable timelines for the projects
- d. Checking the current financial status for each project and other financial sources
- e. Providing information for the Stewardship Board to recommend a prioritized list for congregational approval

The **Trustees** outlined the current maintenance of St. John's properties. Work is also being organized for the kitchen project approved by the voters in October.

This project will provide data to see what type of appeal St. John's can handle. A foundational principle of the project is that updates, like appliances, can also be used in future expansion efforts. Work has begun with the contractor and tradespeople on the timetable for the project. Concept drawings and pictures can be viewed electronically at [bit.ly/SJkitchen2023](http://bit.ly/SJkitchen2023). Gifts for this project are currently being received by writing "**Kitchen Project**" on offering envelopes or check memo lines. Most importantly, we pray for Jesus' blessings that this project will benefit our ministry.

The council was also updated on a small group meeting with representative leadership from each congregation. The group discussed questions about the proposed **school agreement** to support St. John's students and the ministry of St. Paul's Lutheran School. The small group found common ground and identified the next steps. The next steps are

- a) for St. John's to provide input into the financial reporting of St. Paul's Lutheran School.
- b) St. Paul's will incorporate the input into the school's financial reporting.

Following these steps, the small group plans to meet in early December to discuss the avenues of communicating school information and financing so that we have a trusting foundation for a St. Paul's and St. John's partnership that supports St. Paul's Lutheran School.

The council also reviewed the list of nominations for the various 2023 St. John's boards and committees. Time was taken to identify people with God-given gifts and abilities that would benefit the group's work. Invitations are being sent to identified individuals.

The next **voters' meeting** is on Monday, Dec. 19, at 7 pm, with holiday refreshments. We will overview the current discussions/position on St. John's expansion and hold our annual elections.

## St. Paul's School

St. Paul's Lutheran School just finished its first quarter, and I've completed my first quarter as Student Learning Coordinator! Many of you are unfamiliar with my title and wondering, "What does a Student Learning Coordinator do?"

**Teach:** One-third of my school day is designated to teaching in grades 7-8. I teach three sections of American History (Civil War-Present) and one section of Pre-Algebra.

**Screen/Assess:** Grades 3-8 use MAPS testing as their universal screener, but nothing is used for grades K-2. We implemented a new universal screening process for grades K-2 (FASTbridges). These assessments are given three times a year. The gathered data helps us identify students who may be struggling. These students receive the intervention(s).

**Organize Interventions:** These are direct, explicit instructions based on the missing skills identified by parents, teachers, or the screening assessments. They are taught in small groups, and their progress is monitored.

**Communicate:** A portion of our students receive special services through New Ulm Public School. I assist with the scheduling and logistics required to work effectively within that partnership. I support the classroom teacher when a student is going through the process of qualifying for special education services.

**Paraprofessionals:** We are blessed with 8 paraprofessionals that work in K-8. I coordinate their schedules as needed, train for screening, offer support, and say "Thank you" to them a lot! What a blessing to serve in this capacity! Thank you for your prayers and support.

Christmas is coming, let earth receive her King. The church library has many books for children that can help you explain the Nativity story to your loved ones. Even some DVD's. Check them out!

This month we have two fiction and no-fiction books to introduce. The two fiction books are by the same author, Francine Rivers. "Redeeming Love" is a novelization of the story of Hosea, from the Bible. He is told by the Lord to stick to his wife even though she is unfaithful, as Jesus sticks to us. The "Echo in Darkness" is the third book in my favorite trilogy, called "Mark of the Lion." It is the story of a rich Roman, who loved a Jewish slave, and thought that she had died in the colosseum with the lions, because she was a Christian. ## Our Synod at Work

### Highlights from the Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary Spotlight

A few weeks back the Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary sent out their Spotlight, which contained recent news about the Seminary. In this month's column we will take a look at some of the information that was contained in this flyer.

The seminary saw an increase in enrollment. The school year began with 148 students enrolled in the seminary. That is the highest enrollment since the fall of 2010. The on-campus enrollment of 130 students is the highest since the fall of 2007, and the junior class has 49 students, which is the largest junior class since the fall of 2006.

The seminary's governing board, in conjunction with WELS Joint Mission Council, is in the process of calling a new director of the Pastoral Studies Institute. The new director will replace Professor Jon Bare, who accepted the Lord's call to serve as president of Asia Lutheran Seminary. Also, the governing board, in its February meeting, will be extending a call for a new professor, which will address a vacancy resulting from Professor Paul Wendland's decision to retire at the end of the

2022-23 school year. When he retires, he will have served 22 at the seminary (with 15 of those years as President).

During the past year, a committee worked with HGA to develop a master site plan. A primary feature of that plan is an educational center that will provide six new classrooms. The plans also call for a new gathering space attached to the auditorium/gymnasium. The old classrooms would then be converted into faculty offices to facilitate collaboration between professors and encourage more regular interaction between students and faculty. The seminary will conduct a feasibility study sometime during this school year to determine if, and when, a building project might be undertaken.

The seminary faculty is actively working on a self-study as part of the process of seeking accreditation from the Association of Theological Schools. The accrediting agency does not insist that institutions have certain policies, procedures, or practices in place, but they have established standards that individual schools can fulfill in different ways (depending on the institution's mission). The self-study provides an opportunity to consider how the seminary can better carry out its mission of forming pastors to proclaim God's praise.

Students at the seminary receive assistance from their home congregations, from Salem Foundation, from other groups, and from the seminary's financial aid funds. On average, students receive support that exceeds the cost of tuition for the year, but students must still provide for their living expenses.

Over the past ten years, Pastor Partners has served recently graduated pastors by pairing them with a mentor pastor within their district. Grow in Grace provides training to mentor pastors in key areas where mentees can benefit the most, including time management/family (which was the primary focus for 2022).
