What If...?

When I go through St. Paul's classrooms answering "Pastor Questions," I often get some unusual questions that I can't answer. For some reason, most are about how old someone was when they died. "How old was Thomas when he died?" "Sorry, kid. I have no idea. God doesn't tell us." But often I get "What if...?" questions. "What if Lazarus were never born?" "Well... I guess he wouldn't have died and Jesus wouldn't have raised him from the dead. He would have raised another person instead."

Do you ever wonder, "What if...?" What if there were no cars? How would you get to work? Would you ride a bike? Would you walk? Would you ride in a horse-drawn carriage?

What if there were no computers? Well, you'd need to buy more paper and more stamps without email, right? Or maybe you'd get a typewriter. Forget online banking, most credit card machines, navigation systems, not to mention all your video games!

What if there were no resurrection from the dead? And specifically, what if Jesus didn't physically rise from the dead? Some in Paul's day were saying just that; that there was no resurrection from the dead, not really. "Maybe you could live on in people's memories as they remembered what you did while you were alive. Maybe you could leave a legacy behind that would improve the lives of others because of what you did. But to rise, bodily, physically, to come back to life after being dead... well... that's the stuff of fiction," they said.

But Paul challenged their thinking. He considered what life would be like if they were right. What if Jesus never rose from the dead? *"If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith."* (1 Corinthians 15:13-14)

"What if...?" What if this life is all there is? The Beatles famously sang, "Imagine there's no heaven—It's easy if you try—No hell below us, Above us only sky." Can you imagine if they were right? What if there is nothing more than this life?

Well, Paul answers that question. If Christ did not rise, then Christianity falls apart. If Christ did not rise, then there is no resurrection at all; this life is all there is. Enjoy it. Then die. Become worm food. We have no moral responsibility, no obligations to serve anyone but us, so, "Eat, drink, and be merry. For tomorrow we die."

But let's look at the evidence... Can we all agree on these historical facts that nearly all scholars, Christian and atheist alike, all hold to be true:

- 1. Jesus died by Roman crucifixion
- 2. Jesus was buried in a private tomb.
- 3. His disciples were discouraged after that event.
- 4. Jesus' tomb was found empty.
- 5. His disciples thought they actually saw the risen Jesus on a number of occasions.
- 6. Due to these experiences they were willing to die for their belief.
- 7. James, a skeptic, was converted and became a leader of the early church.
- 8. Saul of Tarsus, an opponent of Christianity, was converted and became a major proponent of Christianity.

The New Testament story is not a legend. It was written within two generations of the events by eyewitnesses and was corroborated by non-Christian historians. More than thirty historical figures are confirmed by sources outside of New Testament. The accounts we have are not legends.

The New Testament story is not a lie. The authors include embarrassing details about themselves, difficult saying that they didn't understand, and clearly distinguish Jesus' words from their own. They also reference verifiable facts and witnesses and provoked their readers and their enemies to check it out for themselves! And if that wasn't enough, their martyrdom certainly removes all doubt. Who dies for lies? The accounts we have are not lies.

The last "out" that those who want to deny the Gospel have is to suggest that, "They were deceived. They believed it, but were mistaken, or fooled."

Here are the five most common explanations offered...

- #1 "The disciples were hallucinating." But hallucinations are experienced by individuals, not groups. No one says, "Remember the dream we had?" Not to mention, Jesus didn't just appear once to one person, but dozens of times to hundreds of people who physically touched him and watched him eat food.
- #2 "The disciples went to the wrong tomb." But why didn't enemies reveal the "right" tomb then? Did the guards mess up too? Collective amnesia of Jews, Romans, and Christians? Plus, the empty tomb didn't convince them, but resurrection appearances. Especially Saul/Paul and James who both died as martyrs.
- #3 The "Swoon Theory." Some suggest that Jesus didn't really die, only swooned or fainted. Later, he revived and escaped. But professional executioners were convinced that he was dead. Pilate double-checked. Joseph and Nicodemus embalmed him. Who mistakenly embalms a living person? And, if he merely swooned, then how did he move the rock and get past the guards? Even non-Christian sources, including the Jewish Talmud (which is not exactly friendly to Christianity), state that Jesus was killed on the cross.
- #4 "The disciples stole the body." But then they were the deceivers and not the deceived. Again, who would be arrested, beaten, tortured, and martyred for what they knew to be a lie? "Who dies for lies?" Yet, that's what the guards asserted: The body was stolen while they slept. But think about it: How would the guards know the disciples stole the body if they were asleep? And finally...
- #5 "A substitute (likely, Judas) was killed in his place." This is actually written in the Muslim Quran. But there is no evidence. This theory comes hundreds of years after the events and suggests that all the eyewitnesses were mistaken about Jesus' identity. It also fails to explain why the tomb of the mistaken man was later found empty, why the Talmud reports Jesus' death, and basically suggests that everyone from the 1st century was wrong.

Someone once said that, "Skeptics must provide more than alternative theories for the resurrection. They must provide first century evidence for those theories." And yet, there is no evidence of any other explanation. When you consider the evidence, there is only one reasonable conclusion: "But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead..." (1 Corinthians 15:20) And thank God that you know this is true.

For because of our sin, we have earned death. For all the times we've been too distracted by the entertainment the world throws our way to even consider the evidence or bother studying it, for all the times we've let satan keep us blindfolded, happy to never consider the "What if..."s, for all the times we've chosen not to believe the truth that stared us in the face because it would mean that our selfish desires would be unrealized... for our sin we deserve death. "And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins."

"But... Christ has indeed been raised from the dead..." (1 Corinthians 15:20) Through Christ, his perfect life lived on our behalf, and his innocent death on the cross, our sins are forgiven! He's paid the price that we owe! He gave us credit for all the good he did! And Jesus' resurrection is the proof that God accepted it! *"He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification."* (Romans 4:25)

What if there were no cars? Well, we'd all be in a little better shape. What if there were no computers? Well, we'd have to come up with different ways to work. What if there were no telephones? We'd get used to telegraphs and passenger pigeons.

But so what!? None of that matters compared to this "What if...": What if Jesus had never been raised? Well, then, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins... If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are to be pitied more than all men." So thank God that you know this glorious truth: "But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead..." Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

St. Paul's Lutheran School

The 2023-24 school year continues, and much work has been completed as we prepare for the coming 2024-25 school year. Three primary questions dominated the discussions:

To the first question, the decision was made to permanently call Mrs. Klug. Along with that decision, Mrs. Spike will be moving to teach in a fourth Grades 3 & 4 classroom to aid with the two large grades we will have at that level next year. God be praised for faithful servants!

To the second question, the EANS (Emergency Assistance to Non-Public Schools) funding has been a fantastic blessing, allowing our school to hire and pay a large complement of paraprofessionals and providing budget flexibility to add additional help in other areas and ways. However, that funding is now complete, so the discussion shifted to what we can do moving forward. For the 2024-25 school year, the BOCD recommends including the funding required for 4.5 FTE (full-time equivalent) paraprofessional positions in the budget.

This leads to the final question, focusing on tuition. Since the 2019-20 school year, we have made some significant changes to our faculty, moving from a part-time to full-time Student Learning Coordinator and adding a faculty member in the lower grades, investing in current and ongoing improvements in our curriculum, and now incorporating back into our budget 4.5 FTE paraprofessional positions. The BOCD has set the tuition for the 2024-25 school year as follows:

Partner Tuition (1st Child) - \$2,025 Non-Partner Tuition (Each Child) - \$4,794.75

Partner Tuition is available to families who are current members at St. Paul's, New Ulm; St. John's, New Ulm; or St. John's, Sleepy Eye. Non-Partner Tuition is available to all other families. Partner Families can apply for tuition assistance. The form can be downloaded from our school's website, <u>https://school.splnewulm.org/admissions/</u>.

President's Report. Thanks to Wayne Wels and Paul Willems, who completed the financial review of St John's 2023 financial books. The books are in order. Also, Wayne shared that after many years of doing the audit, he will not be involved with it in the future. Thank you, Wayne, for your many years of service!

Board of Youth and Education. The WELS Youth Rally will take place in Colorado this summer. We are beginning to coordinate with St. Paul's for travel to the rally and other mission trips. For past youth rallies, we were able to assist parents with some of the expenses, but are not planning to for this rally. The cost for the rally is \$410 and the travel costs may be around \$100. Some members have expressed interest in helping with the travel costs outside of the St. John's budget. Please speak to BoYE member Jon Hermanson for further details.

- Sunday morning Bible study at the end of this spring semester is on the principles of Lutheran worship, beginning after Easter.
- Annual soccer camp on June 3-6 at the MLC soccer pitch.

Board of Evangelism. Chair Zahrt reported that the Easter banners are up in the entryway. These banners have been up for a few weeks now during Lent. Banners have been put up for Christmas and Easter for a couple of years now, so it was a good test for the durability of our initial concept. The BoEV is evaluating the banners as a whole. They are appreciated by the greater majority of members and the public, but there are some legitimate concerns we want to address. Chairman Jesse Zahrt is ready to receive input.

Stewardship. Evidence of Jesus' grace in the lives of our members is viewed in a way through our revenue picture. This past February, we had a positive revenue picture (\$23,200) vs. February 2023. A large % of members have increased offerings since last fall. So, "let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching"

(Hebrews 10:23-25).

Trustees. Chairman Sam Hunter reported three items of note:

- 1. Following a February Council discussion regarding safety during Bible Class, we located the AED and remounted the device on a wall visible within the fellowship hall.
- 2. Work was done to get a television in the baby/family room so that the service can be streamed visually for those needing the space.
- 3. Kitchen Microwave Shelving has been lowered. It was initially installed at a taller height, making it difficult for those working in the room to transfer hot materials above normal reaching levels.

Campus Facility Task Force. The group updated the Council on the sanctuary renovation timeline: Sanctuary chairs will be delivered over the next 6-10 weeks

- 1. Sanctuary will be painted the first week in May
- 2. Flooring delivery is planned for late May
- 3. Chancel side rooms and closets will need to be cleared in late May/right before work begins in June
- 4. Pew fabric and pew pad delivery is planned for early June
 - Solution Flooring, pew fabric, and pew pad will need to be stored for a few weeks before renovation, potentially in the new narthex or basement

K-12 Educational Assistance. The council approved redesignating \$790 from an endowment distribution from 2 years ago. The money was not designated yet. This year the endowment committee had recommended that the current 2023 distribution be directed toward this fund.

Future meetings:

The next Church Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 16, at 7:00 p.m. The next quarterly voters' meeting is scheduled for Monday, April 23, at 7:00 p.m.

Stewardship Thought

"For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again." 2 Corinthians 5:14-15

Math is hard. Well, for me math is hard. All the numbers, equations, and rules. On top of that, some geniuses decided to put in letters, integers, and imaginary numbers! Our Synod at Work

2024 WELS Annual Report: Called to Prepare

We will continue to summarize some of the important information that is contained in this year's WELS Annual Report to members. This month we will began a two-part series on the section entitled "Called to Prepare." We will look at the Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary while next month we will focus on Martin Luther College and our two preparatory schools—Michigan Lutheran Seminary and Luther Preparatory School.

The Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary prepares men to serve in the pastoral ministry by providing them with spiritual, theological, and professional training. Students attend classes for two years, serve as full-time vicars during their third year, and then attend classes and write a thesis in their fourth year. Throughout their time at the seminary, students receive opportunities to serve in a variety of ministries and to experience other cultures to help prepare them for their future calls.

Thirty-nine students graduated on May 26, 2023. The day before, the seminary held its assignment service, where nine of those graduates were assigned to home and world mission fields. After the service, graduates met with their district presidents and with representatives from WELS Home Missions. Four graduates who received a Master of Divinity degree were considered "non-traditional" or second career students.

Following graduation, the seminary provides pastors with opportunities for continued growth through its institute, Grow in Grace. Grow in Grace offers continuing education courses, a mentoring initiative for new graduates, a clearinghouse of resources for pastors, and an annual retreat for pastors who are celebrating milestones in their ministries. In January, the Seminary offers students a two-week learning opportunity known as Winterim. Classes range from special topics presented in the classroom to trips to important biblical locations to time working with home mission congregations. In 2023, the seminary teamed up with WELS Home Missions to organize a church planting course hosted at The Way in Fredericksburg, Virginia. The course was led by home missionaries. Eleven seminarians traveled to Virginia to learn more about staring new churches in places where WELS may not have an established presence.

The Pastoral Studies Institute is a program coordinated by WELS Joint Missions and Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary that guides and assists spiritual leaders around the globe through pre-seminary and seminary training. Many are the classes are online and most students take one or two classes at a time since they also work full time.

As mentioned earlier in the column, next month we will continue to look at the section "Called to Prepare" by looking at Martin Luther College and the two preparatory schools.
