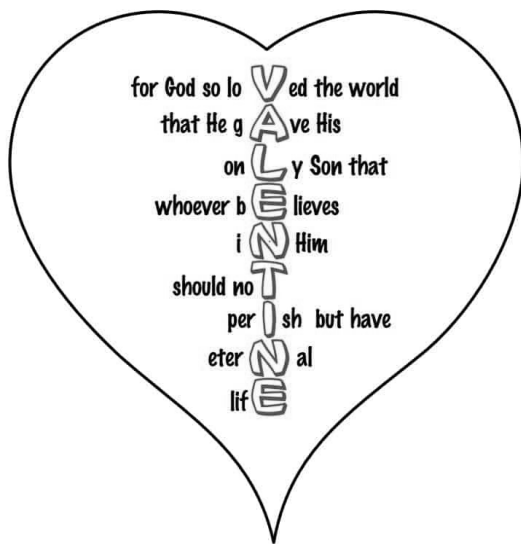

February 2025 Glory and Dishonor & Extreme Salvation

Luke 9:28-36 About eight days after Jesus said this, he took Peter, John and James with him and went up onto a mountain to pray. ²⁹As he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning. ³⁰Two men, Moses and Elijah, ³¹appeared in glorious splendor, talking with Jesus. They spoke about his departure, which he was about to bring to fulfillment at Jerusalem. ³²Peter and his companions were very sleepy, but when they became fully awake, they saw his glory and the two men standing with him. ³³As the men were leaving Jesus, Peter said to him, "Master, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters-- one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." (He did not know what he was saying.) ³⁴While he was speaking, a cloud appeared and enveloped them, and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. ³⁵A voice came from the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to him." ³⁶When the voice had spoken, they found that Jesus was alone. The disciples kept this to themselves, and told no one at that time what they had seen.

As we walk with the Gospel writers through the Church Year, before leaving Epiphany behind and setting foot on the Lenten road, we come to the Mount of Transfiguration. It is really the event which bridges the two events together and gives us the full picture of Christ's mission.

In the Epiphany of our Lord, Jesus was made manifest as the Savior of the whole world. He had come to redeem all people, both Jews and Gentiles, by living in their place and by dying on the cross for their sins. A star directed the way of the wise men who sought him. The glorious promise of peace and reconciliation with God was now fulfilled before the eyes of the world in the person of Jesus Christ. But it was glory hidden in a little baby born under very humble circumstances.

In Lent we see the passion of the Christ, that is, the suffering, mockery, and death of our Lord. We see the curse of sin laid upon the righteous Son of God who had become a curse for us by bearing our guilt on the cross.

The Lenten road which ends at the tomb, where the seemingly unmovable stone is placed in our path at the mouth of the sepulcher. However, ultimately it becomes the road to joy as the angel moves the stone out of our way in order to allow to see that the Christ is no longer there, for he is risen.

From glory to dishonor, and from humility to exaltation... The strange and mysterious work of Jesus Christ goes from one extreme to another.

So it is with the Transfiguration of our Lord. There, on the otherwise unknown mount, Jesus takes three of his apostles and is transfigured before them. His garments shine like lightning and his face gleams as the sun. And this only about six to eight days after Jesus has told his followers that he is going to Jerusalem in order to be crucified.

Jesus had to make his way to the cross in order to die for our sins or we would have been lost eternally in hell. Jesus had to be crucified so that with his blood he could pay our debt to God and take away our guilt.

To sinners who, due to our sinful nature, fail to understand the extreme work of salvation, Jesus manifests his glory. He is transfigured before our eyes in order to remind us that his Epiphany really does not end with Lent. He is still the Lord of lords and the King of kings. He is not Elijah, as some suspected, but he appears with Elijah and Moses, men of God, to show that his message is one and the same with theirs. Although disguised in human flesh, he is still God. He has come to accomplish the mission for which God sent him.

The Bible says, Jesus, Moses, and Elijah spoke about Jesus = departure, which he was about to bring to fulfillment at Jerusalem. The Greek word for departure is exodus, literally, the Aroad out. Jesus would indeed leave this world in death, but would return again, alive and glorified. His exodus would also be an exodus for us, for he would lead us out of the slavery of sin, just as Moses led the exodus of Israel out of Egypt.

Therefore, as we leave the Mount of Transfiguration and set foot on the Lenten path which leads to pain, sorrow, suffering and death for our Lord, we can also know that, just as the Israelites finally reached the land of promise, even so, the fulfillment of a much greater promise awaits us. We can leave the Mount and enter the valley with the vision of the glorified Christ. We can know that even as he hangs on the cross and cries out in the agony of hell itself, he is still God. We can be certain that even as he is placed in the tomb, it is not the end. He shall rise, and the glory hidden in human flesh will once again shine forth in even greater measure than at the Transfiguration. What is more, the mountain top experience with our Lord is for us the down payment, so to speak, which secures the promise that the rest is coming. We have the deposit guaranteeing the forgiveness of sins, reconciliation with God, and life everlasting.

At the zenith of the Epiphany is the Transfiguration. But from the Mount we go down to the valley in order to enter Lent. From one extreme to another we walk with Christ. But we can be also be sure that the pains and sorrows of this life will eventually be replaced by something much better. From one extreme to another we walk with Christ, until from sin, death, and sorrow, which shall enter into peace, joy, and life forever in heaven.

"You can be like faithful Aaron, holding up the prophet's hands." - CW 745. Many of us have joyfully sung that inspiring lyric since childhood and truly want to be a source of support for our spiritual leaders.

The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field. - Matthew 9:37-38

From the beginnings of the Christian church to now and to the end of time, these gifts to the church have been and will be in short supply. Still, God invites and directs us to pray for such laborers and promises to provide them in His grace.

Our recent 75th anniversary encouraged us to recall and rejoice over the many ways God has blessed our faith family. Among those blessings are many "laborers in the harvest field" and those training to become such with whom we regularly worship and live.

Over the years, God has also given over 200 sons and daughters of St John's a desire to say, "Here am I," and train for public ministry as their vocation. Below are some ways in which we can hold up their hands.

Greet the young people you suspect to be MLC students when they worship with us. Introduce yourself, learn their name, and thank/encourage them in their preparation.

- Support St John's members training for ministry with a gift to our Ministerial Education Scholarship. Gifts to that fund will reduce our students' tuition bills via MLC's [Congregational](#)

[Partner Grant Program](#). That program graciously matches gifts that congregations make to their member students. Last year, St John's gave each of our MLC students \$750, which was matched for a \$1500 impact. Thank you for your generosity. As wonderful as that is, the program allows up to \$1600 to be matched. That means we could give them each an additional \$1700 yearly (or \$6800 more over 4 years). Let's commit to fully funding that grant and encouraging, supporting, and blessing our own in that way.

- Pray for our students. Below are listed the 8 young men and women from our church currently preparing for ministry at MLC and one at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary.

Heavenly Father, thank you for leading our sons and daughters to say "Here am I" and prepare for public ministry. Please bless them with a double measure of your Spirit so they may grow in faith as they study your word, reflect on their baptism, and receive your body and blood. Help me to personally encourage them and others in our church who have gifts to serve you in this way. Ushering Update

In December, I updated the congregation on the existing and on-going challenges with recruiting men willing to commit to serving as ushers, and as a result moved in the direction of including women on usher crews. In January, I met with the Board of Elders on this topic. It is the decision of the Elders that women are not to serve as ushers currently. While they agreed that there is nothing doctrinally prohibiting women from serving in this role, they prefer that it continue to be reserved as a pathway to encourage confirmed male members toward service in leadership roles. Additionally, the decision was made so as not to present a stumbling block to some worshippers.

I want to personally apologize to those who saw this action as a stumbling block. It was not my goal to promote a solution that would cause an obstacle to faith but rather encourage the use of the gifts our members have. Women are encouraged to continue to serve as greeters, advance slides, stream services, on the Altar Guild, and other ministry options within St. John's. There is a need for 10 confirmed men to serve as ushers so that each crew can operate in good order. The greatest need is still on Saturday nights. Listed below are the specific openings:

- Saturday Evenings (4)
- Sunday 8am (2)
- Sunday 9:30am (2)
- Sunday 11am (2)

Men, please contact me if you are willing and able to commit to serving on a designated crew listed above.

Usher crews serve one month on, one month off. The average time commitment is 1.5 hours per service, but this is during

the time that you would be coming to church anyways, just a little earlier.

Ushering is a wonderful way to serve with little commitment required outside of your time dedicated to worship each week. The purpose of the usher program is to ensure the good order of our worship services. Ushers serve on the front line of evangelism for guests attending St. John's and seek to ensure that all worshippers feel welcome and safe during the service. The Greeter program is open to our youth in confirmation class and all members. For more specifics, please contact me for position descriptions for either role. Our annual Usher/Greeter Training is scheduled for Saturday, February 22nd from 9am – 10:30am. All who are interested are welcome to attend. Climate Changes Impacting Farmers

December has traditionally been a rainy month, crucial for our local farmers in Malawi. However, this year, we are facing an unexpected heat wave that poses a serious threat to their livelihoods. Many farmers who have already planted their crops are now watching them wilt under the relentless sun, this has caused huge devastation with the current cost of agricultural supplies which has skyrocketed, making it even more challenging. Just two years ago, the price of fertilizer was around 20,000 Malawi Kwacha (\$20), but now it has risen to an alarming 120,000 Malawi Kwacha (\$70). This steep increase strains our farmers' budgets and limits their ability to sustain their crops. The implications are dire, if this heat wave continues, we may face a significant drop in yields, leading to potential food shortages and increased hunger in our communities. The combination of wilting crops and high input costs paints a troubling picture for the coming months for many Malawians.

Gratitude for Support

Despite these challenges, we find strength in our community. We want to express our heartfelt gratitude to CAMM and our generous donors

who through your donations, made this year impactful in the communities Lutheran Mobile Clinic serves. As a token of thanks to our dedicated staff we organized a wonderful early Christmas dinner for our general staff and a festive lunch for our professional staff just to appreciate them for their tireless work during 2024. The team's commitment and efforts on behalf of the Lutheran Mobile Clinic and CAMM are truly appreciated. We also extend our thanks to our generous donors who have contributed various donations, including monetary gifts, baby clothes pill bottles etc. Your support plays a vital role in helping us serve those in need, bringing comfort and joy during this season of giving. 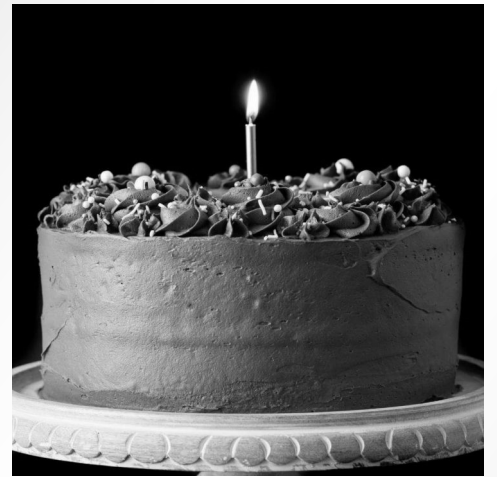
